MINUTES

- I. Welcome and Introductions – History of Compton College was shared by host, Amber Gillis, and introduction of attendees.

- II. Area C Meetings
 - A. Spring 2019 Meeting –March 23, 2018, Location determined to be Citrus College.
 - B. Fall 2019 Location determined to be Rio Hondo.
Rio Hondo, Citrus College and Mt. San Antonio College – have volunteered previously

- III. Reports
 - A. ASCCC Update –John Stanskas, President
 - President’s Update is sent to broader audience including CIOs, CSSO, ACRO, CCCAOE, Trustees, Legislative, BOG, LAO, DOF, as well as invitations to ASCCC Plenary. Collegiality in Action – boards are obligated to ensure the effective participation of faculty, staff, and students. John is encouraging local senates to consider how effective participation is done with regards to the advice and judgement of the senate – includes feedback from students and classified staff.
 - AB 705 Implementation/Guided Pathways – Less than 60% of our students (statewide) are under 25 years old. The average number of units/term = 7 or 8. Therefore, most of our students are not full-time and coming directly from high school. There are ways to improve services for all students, including those who are not able to be full-time students directly from high school. John is encouraging faculty to consider all students in the implementation of these and other initiatives.
 - Fall Plenary, Nov 1-3, Irvine – Halloween is the night before Plenary this year. A sponsored by OEI reception will be held on Halloween night (7-9:30 pm), costumes are optional. President’s Reception is on November 1 which is *Dia de los Muertos*, so this is the theme for the reception. There are 5 General Sessions, the four areas of focus for ASCCC (faculty hiring and diversity, Guided Pathways, AB 705 Implementation, Strong Workforce) and the

Student Centered Funding Formula. There is a strand related to professional development for senate leaders.

- Legislative Update – We are at the end of 2-year cycle of legislation. A new 2-year cycle starts January 2019. AB 310 (Medina) related to part-time faculty office hours did not pass. AB 1935 (Irwin) related to tutoring did not go through either. This was her number #1 priority and sponsored by the Chancellor’s Office, the Appropriations Committee did not send it forward as a political message. There are proposed changes to Title 5 to allow for self-referral for tutoring. The Governor signed bills to expand Credit for Prior Learning, extend the sunset date for the baccalaureate degrees programs, and AB 1805 (Irwin), to publish placement policies and data related to.
- C-ID Update – The program has run on one-time funds for the past decade. There is now on-going funding this year for C-ID per the legislator.
- OER Funding – The legislator has funding a proposal from ASCCC to support OER. Is there a way to create online homework system for mathematics.
- Four Priorities of ASCCC this year:
 - a. Strong Workforce –
 - i. Challenges to how equivalencies are determined. Specifically, related to equivalency for the associated degree requirement. Are there tools that can be developed. There are plans for regional meetings in the spring to discuss equivalencies and have tools that can be shared locally.
 - ii. Credit for Prior Learning – the priority for focusing on military service. Planning to get more information out to the field by end of this year. There is a presentation from Norco College at Plenary as they have made progress in this area.
 - b. Faculty Diversification – this is something since 1998, that ASCCC has said that faculty must lead. This is a long-term and on-going effort. The data shows that the rate of change is slow. There are factors related to low turnover in the system. There is \$50 Million on-going in the budget to support hiring fulltime faculty. There were IEPI EEO Workshops in September. Human Resources was the main stakeholder group targeted for the workshops. Specifically, focusing on racial and ethnic diversity. There will be General Sessions at Plenary, The League, and CIO conferences this fall. These will focus on the role of faculty and others in the hiring process. There is a co-sponsored summit with the Chancellor’s Office – February 8-9. There are at least three regionals that will follow the summit, to be held at Butte College, Bakersfield College and Norco College. The regionals will include training related to implicit biases in the hiring process and more. Important for colleges to consider how the data of who is in the hiring pools relates to community and demographics of the students. There is seed money in the budget proposal for colleges to grow their own programs, such as building pipelines with universities. ASCCC has asked Chancellor’s Office to write guiding language related

to faculty internships, specifically “under supervision” being interpreted as “in line of sight.”

- c. Guided Pathways/Academic Academy – There are resources online that were generated for the Academic Academy, including webinars. Guided Self-Placement is one effort to support students, and includes if students have specific career interests, expectations related to unit load and time, and more. These may be part of orientation. Is there room for improvement? The Chancellor’s Office is looking to find ways to leverage technology that can be scaled for the system, such as program mapping. There are 4-5 colleges in LACCD that are involved in a pilot program for program mapping with a total of 25 in the pilot across the state. There was a fee of \$50,000 to move the data from the college to the statewide system. There is another pathway tool that will be available in Canvas in the future.
- d. Implementation of AB 705 – Guided Self-Placement also overlaps with the implementation of AB 705, however GSP is broader than placement into English and mathematics. Information sent out over summer, as a joint effort with ASCCC and the Chancellor’s Office with regards to how to comply with Ed Code (as a result of AB 705). Colleges need to understand and serve their communities and need a framework within which to innovate. There is a lot of information going out to the field, however there are 4 primary sources – those three documents sent out over summer and the language of the law. These primary sources are linked in the President’s Report and the AB 705 Implementation on ASCCC website.
 - Closed Sessions for ASCCC – Related to the hiring of Executive Director.
 - New Fully Online College – BOG is serving as the Board of Trustees for this college. They have asked John to serve on the hiring committee for the CEO of this new college. There is a resolution related to ASCCC serving as the senate for this new college until such time fulltime faculty are hired according to Ed Code.
