WHY CONSIDER NONCREDIT?

- Courses are:
 - Free
 - Repeatable
 - Flexible
 - Low-stakes
- Noncredit courses can be used to:
 - Focus on pre-collegiate skills (point of entry to credit)
 - Help underprepared students transition to an academic mindset
 - Provide immigrant students with a way to ease into a new educational setting
 - Create self-paced learning environments and increase contact hours

APPROVED NONCREDIT INSTRUCTION AREAS

- Title 5 Section 58160 authorizes eligibility for state apportionment for the following noncredit instruction areas:
 - A) ESL
 - B) Immigrant Education
 - C) Elementary and Secondary Basic Skills
 - D) Health and Safety
 - E) Substantial Disabilities
 - F) Parenting
 - G) Home Economics
 - H) Courses for Older Adults
 - I) Short Term Vocational
 - J) Workforce Preparation

Noncredit Enhanced Funding: CDCP

- SB361 (2006) increased noncredit funding in CDCP (Career Development/College Prep; also called Enhanced Funding) courses from \$2626 to \$3092 per FTES
- CDCP courses must be sequenced and lead to certificates
- OCDCP Enhanced Funding Categories:
 - ESL
 - Elementary & Secondary Basic Skills
 - Short-term Vocational
 - Workforce Preparation

Course Approval Process

- All noncredit courses must be approved by the Chancellor's Office (CB22 code)
- CDCP Enhanced Funding courses must first be approved by the Chancellor's Office before a proposal for a new CDCP certificate is submitted.
 - Noncredit Certificate of Completion (college prep)
 - Noncredit Certificate of Competency (career development)
- Other Noncredit programs may be approved and offered locally without approval by the Chancellor's Office (no enhanced funding)

CCC Noncredit: 3 Models

- Noncredit as a division of the college
- Noncredit as a free standing school with separate accreditation
 - San Diego Continuing Education
 - North Orange County Community College District, School of Continuing Education
- Noncredit integration into Credit
 - One department (i.e., ESL or Math) offering both noncredit and credit classes
